Memoir Writing, by Michael Williams

A few months ago, I completed my Certification as a Guided Autobiography Instructor. Guided Autobiography (GAB) is a process whereby participants are helped to write memoir pieces two pages at a time following a thematic course through life events. Many find this process helpful in recovering experiences and structuring them into stories that can be stand-alone or part of a larger memoir project.

I have begun offering memoir-writing workshops at the Adelaide Hunter Hoodless Homestead Museum in St. George, Ontario as part of my role as Writer-in-Residence. I also recently began offering a life-writing workshop at the Wellington Retirement Home and Long-Term Care Facility where I work with a group of residents helping them share their life experiences one story at a time. Also, fellow writer and Guild member Anita Joldersma and I have been offering monthly storytelling and readings for residents at the Home. The best part is when residents come to us to share stories that have been inspired by ours. Stories really do connect us.

I've also been facilitating a story circle at the Bob Kemp Hospice once a month and hope to offer a life-writing program there in the fall. There are so many wonderful stories out there just waiting to be told. What a privilege it is to hear them!

A Lesson On Redrafting And Editing Processes, by J. L. Oneill

As writers, we should approach redrafting from a top-down approach. This means tackling the 'big picture' ideas first. Why? Because time is precious. There is nothing more heartbreaking for a writer than spending weeks agonizing over grammar in a 2000-word scene only to realize the scene weakens the chapter and the only solution is that beautifully unforgiving delete key.

It's okay to press your delete key.

When many of us start out writing, one of the most common critiques we receive from experienced writers is: "Your prose is clean, but where's the plot?" It's possible for us to vomit 80K words and forget, or mangle, the plot of our first drafts. Understanding the rules of the plot, just like a plumber needs to understand physics and chemistry and which end of the wrench is for whacking, is important for us writers. We need to study the craft so we can grow as creatives. If we don't, we're gonna wear out those delete keys faster than we can type.

Be nice to your delete key. It just wants to help.

We're going to cover four major steps of redrafting and editing in our workshops to prepare us for Anthology VII. On July 10th, we will dive into the Developmental Phase, where we can learn to be certain that our plots are airtight. No leaky pipes for us!

Things have improved since that first event. Bill now uses Victoria Park where there are lots of trees providing plenty of shade and comfort. There is plenty of room for authors and supporters of Hamilton writers.

Please try to come out and support Bill this year, August 25th from 1:00 until 4:00. I will be there to meet other authors and creative people, regardless of the weather. It is unlike anything I have attended and certainly worth taking in.


Submissions should include the following:




Bi-Weekly Recap: June 2024
